On Wednesday, April 2, we are gathering for an Executive Board Meeting at 11:15am at the Truett Chapel to discuss some momentous accomplishments as an Association. The Missions Development Team and the Administrative Team are recommending that we give the church property formerly known as **Bellmead First Baptist Church** to the new church start, **La Vega Community Church**. It has



taken four years, many hundreds of volunteers, thousands of mission dollars, prayer, sweat and, in some cases, tears to see this new church through 'till today it is incorporated and constituted as a selfsupporting, thriving body of Christ. We thank God for the leaders and workers from Woodway FBC, as well as other sister churches, our missions development team members and the pastors who have contributed to this vision. We give the glory to God for this incarnation of His body in the middle of a vibrant community.

We will also hear a report from Deane Strauss about the progress of the Cornerstone Assistance Network of Central Texas which we launched two years ago. — THE BODY OF BELIEVERS –

Picture a room full of youth from multiple churches who are excitedly worshiping God together. That's what happened for Chalk Bluff, Elm Mott FBC, Lakeview and Oak Lawn during their joined D-Now on Feb. 7-9.

Elm Mott FBC Youth Minister Pierce Vanderslice said, "I think our Saturday night worship (was my favorite part). To have a room full of teenagers, especially in today's world, worship and really get into it is really magical."

Chalk Bluff, Elm Mott FBC and Oak Lawn already combine efforts for 5th Quarter events at Chalk Bluff. The churches have a similar size and outlook. They also cater to the same school district.



Since a weekend youth retreat requires a little more planning than an evening event, the churches joined together to create something special for the Connally area students.

Vanderslice said, "D-Now is something I really value and wanted the students to experience.... The only way to do that was to team up with another church and pull the resources together."

His fellow Truett friends and youth ministers also needed man-power.

Chalk Bluff Youth Minister Ryan Hodges said, "Personally, I came to Truett very excited about what it was like to work in a church. Working in a small church you realize ... you're really the sole leader of the youth ministry.... I just love working together and working stuff out."

Each church provided their own host homes so students could have a time of reflection in a comfortable setting with people they knew well. Everyone came together for meals, worship and a photo scavenger hunt.

"We wanted all the kids to be together as much as possible," Vanderslice said. "We know that when there are more kids, and the room feels more full, it feels more electric.... There's power in numbers."

Church of the Incarnation Young Adults Minister Ryan Waller, Vanderslice's brother -in-law, came from Dallas to be the main speaker. The Art Wellborn Band, a group from Baylor University, led worship. Baylor students also worked as leaders in each of the small groups.

Vanderslice said, "Our hope was that we would present the Gospel to the kids and provide follow-up conversations."

Leaders were told that the one-on-one conversations would be some of the most important times of the weekend.

Vanderslice said, "Watching (youth) living out or committing their lives to Christ really was wonderful."

Hodges said his youth had apprehensions of combining for D-Now, but they adapted well and had fun.

"I think the kids really enjoyed it. Every D-Now is special."

Vanderslice said, "In our debriefing with our own kids ... they really had a good time. They all go to school together so it's really easy for all of them to merge together."

The weekend went so well that the youth leaders are already discussing doing it again next year. They may even combine the youth groups every few Wednesdays for worship and call it "Union."

There's an advertising sign on Highway 6 that says:

"Going to Jail? There's only one thing to do. Call..." Actually, most people who get arrested and are on their way to jail don't know what the one thing is that they are supposed to do. But I do, and perhaps you do too. In fact, that one thing isn't just restricted to going to jail. It's something that you need to do whenever your world is falling apart. Even better, it's something you can do anytime, anywhere and for any reason. What is it? Call on Jesus!



The McLennan County Jail currently houses about 1,000 inmates. The jail offers Jail Ministry Volunteers the opportunity to come and share the good news of Jesus Christ <u>every</u> Sunday from 2:30–3:30pm. There are 13 cells for women and 12 cells for men. This year we've added 4 new volunteers which makes a total of 21 active volunteers. However, not all of our volunteers are able to come every Sunday which means that there are still openings for more volunteers.



I recently attended the African American Leadership Workshop at Truett Seminary sponsored by Texas Baptists. The two-day event offered excellent opportunities to connect with leaders in various areas of ministry. Particularly useful were the workshop sessions led by Dr. Jeffrey Curtis. Participants in those sessions were provided with information on resources for all age groups, including collegeaged students.



The Collegiate Ministries has begun to outline a needs assessment process. Through a variety of approaches we will interact with campus student leaders, faculty and staff to determine student ministry needs. Once specific student needs and ministry opportunities are identified we can begin to assist member churches in helping to meet those needs.
